What CERT does:

Mission-

- ° Resource augmentation
- ° Educational outreach,
- Preparedness best practice instruction and assistance,
- Planning mitigation/preparedness assistance to organizations

Some of what CERT Volunteers can do:

Secondary mission- directly supporting Emergency Management through:

Field Operations

- Traffic control
- Transportation/logistical movements/points of distribution (PODS)
- Search and Rescue (SAR) light urban/wilderness
- Damage assessments
- Firefighter and disaster worker rehabilitation and support

Support Operations


- Communications (ARES) and Viper Radio Support
- Information Technology (live stream/drone ops/command post support)
- Command post operations (EOC/FTOC) including security and information logs
- Shelter Erection and Management (including security and pets/livestock)

What we <u>do not</u> do:




CERT serves as the support for the 911

- ° Support functions more than operations
- Our goal is to assist public safety agencies so that their personnel will not be stretched too thin during emergencies
- Because we recruit volunteers from our population, we bring additional skill sets and subject matter expertise to the Emergency Support Functions (ESF)
- We work hand in hand with community partners under the umbrella of the Incident Command System (ICS)



Community Partners


- Municipal/Volunteer Fire Departments and their auxiliaries
- Emergency Medical Services
- State Forestry and Dept of Emergency Management
- ° Sheriffs Office, Police, Highway Patrol
- County Health Departments, Department of Social Services, Animal Services and others
- Nonprofits, such as American Red Cross, Salvation Army



INCLUSION

- CERTs are formed and operated locally with input from the needs of the community partners
- They are modular and scalable
- All citizens are encouraged to join regardless of age, physical condition or any other social factors
- Everyone can have a duty or responsibility suitable to their wants, interests, and limitations






CERT Volunteer Safety

CERT Members are taught to:
NEVER Self-Deploy
NEVER exceed their training level
NEVER put themselves in a position where they themselves would need to be rescued

- ° NEVER exhaust their own resources
- ° ALWAYS works as part of a team

Basic Training and Beyond

- Local CERTs are registered with FEMA as a Ready.Gov emergency volunteer agency
- For example, AC CERT is registered with the County, and NC Department of Public Safety, North Carolina Emergency Management, as part of the State Emergency Response Team
- Basic training for CERT is the National standard
 317 class (25 hour basic) and includes first aid, light
 rescue, disaster psychology and others
- Additional training available for areas that you want to expand your knowledge and training in
- ° This training is almost ALWAYS free of charge



How about costs to be a CERT member?


° CERT is minimal to no cost to participate:

- ° No dues
- Free training
- Free advanced training from the State/Feds, and travel is sometimes reimbursed
- Basic equipment is usually provided. Purchase only what you would want or need for your needs.

How much time will one need to devote to this organization?

° Quarterly Meetings

- Full team local operational deployments will be exceedingly rare (1-2 major events a year?)
- Single Day Event deployments (typically based upon skill set/specialties)
- Occasional opportunities to assist partners with scheduled events, exercises and training throughout the year
- Opportunities for state/federal qualifications and specialties
- Essentially whatever suits the volunteers needs.
