
The theme for our 34th Annual Meeting is Transitions. As we enter into a new era of academics and practice,

# Welcome to Charlotte!

The 34<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of the Southern Gerontological Society will be held in Charlotte, North Carolina from April 4<sup>th</sup> until the 7th at the Hilton Charlotte University Place. This is a lakeside hotel located only 15 miles from the Charlotte Douglas International Airport and adjacent to UNC Charlotte. It sits among the Shoppes at University Place, which offer exciting dining and shopping experiences in a small lakeside setting within walking distance of the conference hotel. The hotel offers complimentary shuttle transportation within a five mile radius.

Charlotte is full of opportunities for food and fun in addition to the conference activities. The greater Charlotte area is home to multiple eclectic neighborhoods each with something unique to offer visitors. Dilworth is Charlotte's first streetcar suburb and is on the National Register of Historic Places. Its bungalow style homes and oak tree-lined streets blend with a mix of shops

and restaurants along East Boulevard. Newly developed Midtown offers dining, shopping, and a lovely stretch of greenway. If you are into the arts and a little Bohemian style then NoDa (North Davidson) is for you! This former mill-community turned arts-district is just north of uptown and is home to a funky collection of galleries, performance venues and fabulous breweries. Plaza-Midwood is a 1920s revitalized streetcar suburb offering one of Charlotte's most ethnically and socially diverse neighborhoods along with many

unique dining experiences. South End is just a light rail stop away from Center City and offers a mix of restaurants, antique shops, and retail stores. Finally University City, home to the conference venue, is anchored by the University of North Carolina at Charlotte – the UNC system's Urban Research University and sponsor of the Opening Reception.

In addition to our eclectic array of neighborhoods, there are a range of museums and activities. You might enjoy a stop at the Carolina Raptor Center. This is a 57-acre living museum and avian medical facility with over 25 species of raptors in a "zoo-like" setting. The Blumenthal Performing Arts center

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uptown is your "source for all of the best performing arts events in Charlotte." Just down the road is the U.S. National White-water Center which offers mountain-biking, running trails, a climbing center, kayaking, canoeing and rafting. The Levine Museum of the New South houses "the nation's most comprehensive interpretation of post-Civil War Southern history." Concord Mills Mall is one of the region's largest outlet malls and is right down the road from Charlotte Motor Speedway – home to NASCAR.

Closer to the venue are the Mallard Creek, Clark's Creek, and Toby Creek Greenways. These greenways are part of the Carolina Thread Trail system and combine for nine continuous miles of strolling, biking, and running pleasure. Part of the greenway meanders through the UNC Charlotte campus where you can take a detour and explore the public Botanical Gardens on campus or see the brand new UNC Charlotte 49ers football stadium.

The local arrangements committee is working diligently to make sure your SGS experience in Charlotte is memorable and positive. We will host dine-arounds in many of the eclectic neighborhoods and the faculty, students, and alumni from UNC Charlotte's Gerontology Program will be happy to help you get acquainted with the area. Please join us at the opening reception the evening of April 4<sup>th</sup> to meet us and get acquainted with all that Charlotte, North Carolina has to offer.

# HELP SUPPORT THE 2013 SILENT AUCTION!

## Don't forget your Silent Auction donation!

The Silent Auction -- what an enjoyable and successful way to raise funds for the Society and provide great shopping without leaving the hotel.

## This is my first SGS conference. What kind of things should I bring?

Bring anything you think will appeal to SGS meeting participants. Some popular items are: books (autographed ones are nice), jewelry, chocolates, college/university items, collectibles, gifts for children, handmade crafts, gift cards from national store chains (especially bookstores), items that represent your state or region, items you "won" at previous auctions that you didn't really want, or anything with an aging theme. Sometimes we even have a donation of a weekend at a beach condo. You will receive a receipt for your donations that you can use to deduct the full, fair-market value of the item on your income taxes.

## How does the Silent Auction work?

The donated items are displayed on tables, with a bid sheet beside each item. When you find an item you like, write down your bid, making sure your bid is above the required minimum. Throughout the conference, you will want to periodically check your bid, and if someone is bidding against you, raise your bid! At the close of the auction (starting Saturday at 3:30 p.m.), the highest bidder gets the item.

## Where do I take the items I bring for the auction?

The Silent Auction set-up time is Thursday, April 4, 2:00-6:00 p.m. Bring your items then or anytime during the meeting, but the sooner the better for more bidding! Someone will check in your items and give you a receipt.

## When will the Silent Auction take place?

The Silent Auction will be open throughout the conference: Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. and Saturday, 8:00 a.m. - 4:15 p.m. The Silent Auction will be closed during the Awards Luncheon (Saturday, 12:00 - 2:00 p.m.) Silent Auction tables will start closing promptly at 4:15 p.m. on Saturday. When you are visiting the exhibits or taking a coffee break, visit the Silent Auction and place your bids.

## How will I know if I win the items I bid on?

Preferably, be at the auction when it closes on Saturday at 4:15 or arrange for someone to be there for you. As each table is sequentially "closed," take the items you won to the cashier to pay (cash, checks, MasterCard and VISA accepted). If you can't be present at the closing, check at the SGS registration desk later in the afternoon to see if your bids were successful. Or come to the Closing Brunch on Sunday. Any items not claimed before the Brunch will be auctioned off live at that time.
